Voters to consider \$34,525,250 budget proposal

Voorheesville Central School District residents will head to the polls on Tuesday, May 20, to vote on a proposed \$34,525,250 budget for the 2025-26 school year. The proposed budget would preserve all current academic programs, staffing and funds for needed maintenance projects throughout our schools.

This budget represents an increase in spending of \$42,884 or 0.12% over the current year and carries a tax levy increase of 5.97%, which does not exceed the statecalculated limit. As a result, a simple majority vote (50% plus one vote) is needed for approval.

The VCSD Board of Education and administration have worked together to formulate a spending plan that continues our focus on improving academic growth and achievement, while being respectful of community residents in these challenging economic times. To this end, the budget proposal includes the use of \$1.8M in reserve funds/dedicated savings to minimize the impact

An amount of \$1,020,787 is included in the budget proposal to cover debt repayment related to the 2022 capital improvement project. Absent this one-time event, the tax levy increase would be 3.47%.

The VCSD Board of Education approved the proposed budget on April 7, 2025.

The school budget vote will be held on May 20, from 2:30-9 p.m. in the Middle School Foyer. At that time, district residents will also vote to fill two open seats on the school board.

Maintaining programs, supporting safe and secure schools

The budget proposal would allow VCSD to maintain class sizes and continue all current programs and services, including, but not limited to:

- College and career-ready coursework, such as distance learning, advanced placement and BOCES Career & Technical Education.
- Special education.
- Social emotional initiatives.
- Extracurriculars, clubs and activities.

Along with funding for our educational program and to ensure the safety and security of our campus, the proposal includes the addition of a part-time social worker to address increased student needs.





The VCSD partnership with BOCES Career & Technical Education is one of many opportunities we offer our high schoolers to develop their unique interests, skills and talents. This year, 18 of our students are acquiring skills for careers in construction, criminal justice, healthcare and more.

Educating the whole learner

Ensuring each of our students have the skills and habits for success-now and once they leave our schoolsremains a priority at VCSD. We know a well-prepared learner is a well-rounded individual.

To that end, we continue to emphasize learning that lays both a solid foundation of essential skills *and* helps expand students' interests and aspirations. Examples from our schools include:

Building readers and writers. The Wonders program at Voorheesville Elementary School is helping our students become proficient at reading and writingessential ways we take in information and express ourselves and our ideas. This program, which emphasizes literacy basics such as phonics and authentic reading practice, aligns with the state's emphasis on literacy learning for all. In just its second year, we are already seeing an overall increase in our students' proficiency as reflected by their state ELA assessments.

Exploring their futures. From our career cafes, which bring students into conversation with area business and organizations, and college fairs to hands-on learning such as job shadowing and BOCES Career & Technical Education, we help our high schoolers imagine their futures with opportunities to dig into their unique interests and learn about jobs and careers they may want to pursue.

Civic-minded scholars. Many students join service clubs and pursue the NYS Seal of Civic Readiness, and all graduating seniors perform 15-hours of community service. Each activity helps students grow as leaders and form community connections.

What happens if the budget is defeated?

If the budget is defeated, the school board has three options: present the same budget for another vote; submit a revised budget for a vote; or adopt a contingent budget.

If the budget is defeated a second time, the board must, by law, adopt a contingent budget.

Under the tax levy cap law, if a district adopts a contingent budget, it cannot increase its tax levy from that of the prior year by any amount, which would trigger a zero percent tax levy increase. That would mean the district would be required to cut approximately \$658,936 from the proposed budget, be subject to various limits and controls on how the money within the contingent budget would be spent and be required to charge fees for public use of school buildings and grounds.




Social and emotional growth

Where the money comes from... SERVICES: 0.47%







BUS PROPOSAL

Voters will also consider a proposition to purchase two 72-passenger diesel school buses as part of its regular replacement of its transportation fleet at a cost of \$371,000. State aid would fund approximately \$201,528 or 64.8% and \$169,472 or 35.2% would come from the local share, which would be paid over a five-year period.

BUS PURCHASE RESERVE FUND

Voters will also consider a proposition to create a reserve fund dedicated to the future purchase of school buses, vehicles and transportation-related equipment.



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Who can vote on May 20

Community members who are U.S. citizens may vote in the school elections if they:

- Have been a resident of the district for at least 30 days and;
- Are at least 18 years old.

ABSENTEE AND EARLY MAIL BALLOTS

Qualified voters can vote by absentee or early mail ballot. You must complete an application to receive a ballot.

- Applications for an absentee or early mail voter ballot must be received no later than May 13 at 3 p.m. if the ballot is to be sent to the voter by mail.
- Ballots MUST be returned by May 20, 2025, in order to be counted.
